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ORGANIC, INORGANIC & HYBRID PIGMENTS

Not all pigments behave the same way in the skin. Understanding the difference between organic, inorganic, and hybrid pigments helps you choose the right product for each client.



Organic Pigments

- Derived from carbon-based compounds
- Tend to produce brighter colors
- May fade faster over time
- Can shift in hue as they break down



Inorganic Pigments

- Made from mineral-based compounds
- More stable and longer-lasting
- Tend toward muted, natural tones
- Less likely to shift in color



Hybrid Pigments

- Combine organic and inorganic ingredients
- Designed for color vibrancy + stability
- Popular in modern scar camouflage
- Offer a balance of performance traits

MARKLESS PRO TIP

For scar camouflage, inorganic and hybrid pigments are generally preferred because they offer more predictable healed results and are less likely to shift over time.

Key Takeaway

THE COLOR WHEEL EVERY ARTIST SHOULD KNOW

Scar camouflage isn't just picking a matching color — it's neutralizing the wrong one first.



- ✓ Blue neutralizes Orange
- ✓ Red neutralizes Green
- ✓ Yellow neutralizes Purple

If a scar heals with an unwanted undertone — too orange, too red, too gray — the fix isn't a random darker or lighter pigment. It's the color directly across the wheel. This single principle is behind most professional color correction work.

MARKLESS PRO TIP

Guessing at correction shades is how results go wrong. Understanding the wheel is how you fix them with confidence.

HOW TO READ THE UNDERTONE OF YOUR PREMADE INK

Before you open the bottle, you need to know what is inside it.

Every premade ink has a dominant undertone — warm, cool, or neutral. This undertone determines how the color will interact with your client's skin and how it will shift over time.

Most artists choose ink by looking at the color in the bottle. But the color in the bottle is not the color that heals in the skin.

Understanding the undertone of your ink before you apply it is one of the most important skills in scar camouflage.



WARM



COOL



NEUTRAL

Every premade ink leans toward one of these three undertones.

THE THREE UNDERTONE CATEGORIES

WARM UNDERTONE INKS

- Base colors: yellow, red, orange
- Heals with a peachy or golden tone
- Works well on warm-toned skin
- Risk: can shift orange or red over time on cool-toned skin

COOL UNDERTONE INKS

- Base colors: blue, pink, gray
- Heals with an ashy or pinkish tone
- Works well on cool or neutral skin
- Risk: can appear gray or lavender on warm-toned skin over time

NEUTRAL UNDERTONE INKS

- Balanced mix of warm and cool
- Most versatile for a range of skin tones
- Preferred for first sessions when undertone is uncertain
- Risk: may require adjustment in follow-up sessions for exact match



MARKLESS PRO TIP

Never assume the ink undertone matches the client's skin undertone just because the color looks similar in the bottle. Always test on the inner wrist or a small area of the scar and assess the healed result before committing to full coverage.

KEY TAKEAWAY

Warm ink on cool skin shifts. Cool ink on warm skin fades gray. Matching the undertone is not optional — it is the foundation of a result that lasts.

WHERE DOES THE PIGMENT BELONG?

Successful scar camouflage depends on placing pigment in the correct layer of the skin. Implanting too shallow or too deep can affect healed results.

Epidermis (Top Layer).

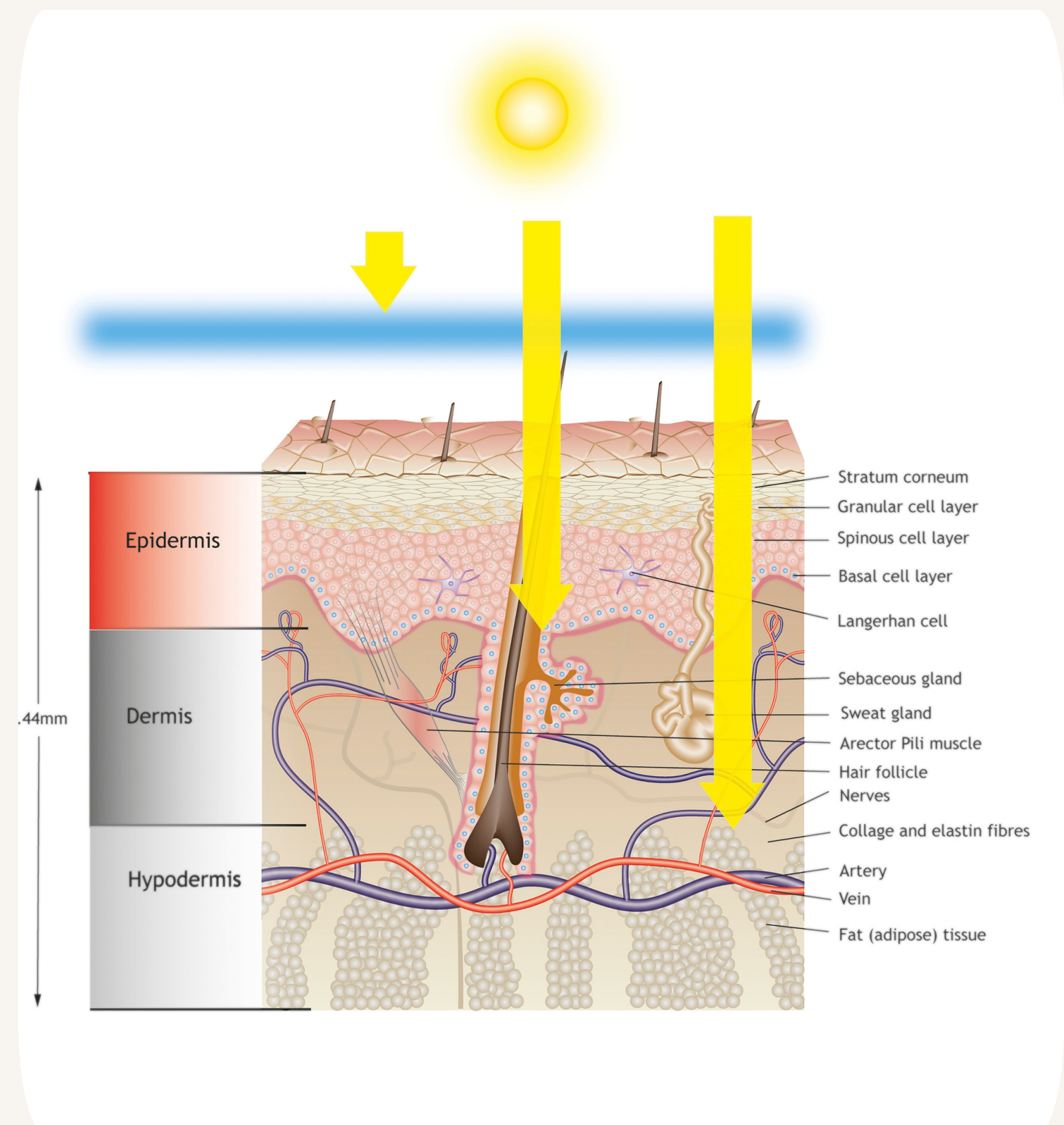
- Pigment placed here will naturally shed during skin renewal.
- Results heal too light or disappear.

Dermis (Target Layer).

- The ideal layer for pigment implantation.
- Provides the best opportunity for long-term healed results.

Too Deep

- Excessive depth may increase unnecessary trauma.
- It can contribute to blurred pigment or unpredictable healed results.



Remember

The goal is consistency, not depth.

A consistent implantation technique produces more predictable healing than simply working deeper.

Successful camouflage is about precision, not force.

WHY DOES PIGMENT SOMETIMES FADE OR HEAL DARKER?

One of the biggest misconceptions in scar camouflage is that pigment always heals lighter. In many cases, camouflage pigment may soften or fade during healing. However, scar tissue is unpredictable, and in rare cases the healed result may appear darker than expected. This is not always caused by poor technique or the pigment itself. Sometimes, the skin simply responds differently.

PIGMENT MAY HEAL LIGHTER WHEN:

- ✓ The scar retains less pigment
- ✓ The implantation was too shallow
- ✓ The skin removes more pigment during healing
- ✓ The client does not follow aftercare
- ✓ The scar tissue is uneven or unstable

PIGMENT MAY HEAL DARKER WHEN:

- ✓ The scar reacts differently than expected
- ✓ The scar tissue retains more pigment than anticipated
- ✓ The surrounding skin creates stronger contrast
- ✓ The skin has an unusual healing response
- ✓ The healed result develops differently than predicted



MARKLESS PRO TIP

Never promise camouflage will always heal lighter. Most cases soften during healing, but scar tissue can be unpredictable — always reassess after full healing before making any correction.

WHY EVERY SCAR HEALS DIFFERENTLY

One of the biggest mistakes beginners make is expecting every scar to heal the same. Scar tissue is unpredictable. Even if two scars look similar, they may retain pigment very differently. This is why no artist can guarantee identical results on every client.



Mature Flat Scar



Hypopigmented Scar



Surgical Scar



Stretch Marks

Every scar is different. Every treatment is unique.

Every Scar Is Unique

Each scar has its own characteristics that affect camouflage, including:

- ✓ Scar maturity
- ✓ Thickness and density
- ✓ Texture
- ✓ Blood supply
- ✓ Previous treatments or surgeries
- ✓ Individual healing response

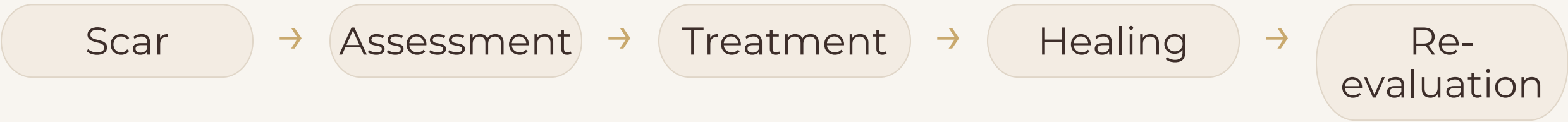
Because of these differences, one scar may retain pigment beautifully, while another may require additional sessions.

What This Means for the Artist

Successful camouflage is not about using the same technique on every client.

It is about evaluating each scar individually and adjusting your treatment plan based on how that specific scar responds.

Patience and proper assessment are essential for achieving natural-looking results.



MARKLESS PRO TIP

Treat the scar in front of you, not the scar you treated yesterday. Every client heals differently.

7 Common Mistakes That Can Affect Your Results

Even experienced artists continue learning.

Avoiding these mistakes can improve consistency.

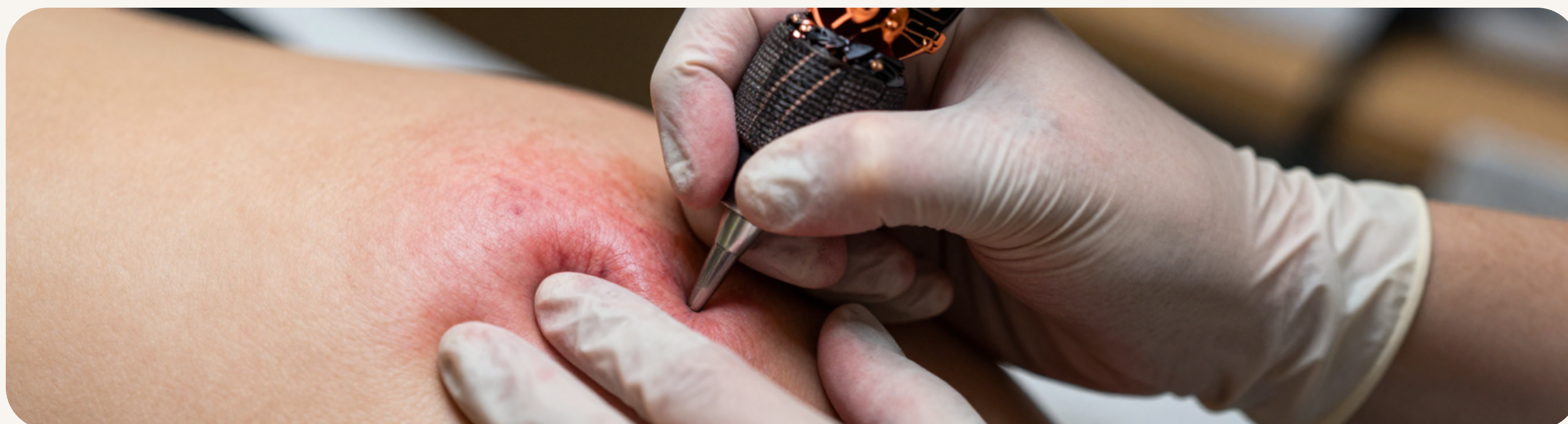
Common Mistakes

- Working too shallow
- Working too aggressively
- Inconsistent skin stretch
- Incorrect machine settings
- Poor scar assessment
- Ignoring aftercare
- Expecting perfect results in one session

Great camouflage is built gradually, not rushed.

Consistency always beats speed.
